

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WVPBRN CELEBRATES 10 YEARS DURING ANNUAL RETREAT

The West Virginia Practice-Based Research Network recently celebrated its 10-year anniversary with its annual retreat. This day-and-a-half event allowed network members from 131 sites to connect, network, and share highlights from the various impactful research projects taking place across West Virginia.

This year's event kicked off with a networking cruise around Stonewall Jackson Lake aboard Stonewall Resort's "Little Sorrel" cruise boat. The following morning opened with a "State of the Network" address from WVPBRN co-directors Dr. Bill Lewis and Jennifer Boyd.

"It's always great to get this group of people together," said Lewis. "The amount of interaction and collaboration that is fostered any time this group is able to come together is really a benefit to practice-based research all across the state." MATTHEW CHRISTIANSEN, MD, MPH

Commissioner and State Health Officer
West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources,
Bureau for Public Health

As a family physician and public health expert, Dr. Matthew Christiansen is passionate about working with West Virginians. His goal is to create real, positive, lasting change in the health of West Virginia's communities that spans into future generations.

In January 2023, Dr. Christiansen was named State Health Officer and Commissioner of the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources' (DHHR) Bureau for Public Health after effectively leading DHHR's West Virginia Office of Drug



Control Policy (ODCP) since October 2020. His recent promotion includes but is not limited to, oversight of the Bureau's nine offices and two centers.

Dr. Christiansen, who is dual board certified in Addiction Medicine and Family Medicine, brings a plethora of experience to the leadership of the Bureau. Prior to his appointment as ODCP Director, he was an Associate Professor at the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, Department of Family & Community Health, and presented both across the tri-state region and in other states from a primary care perspective. Dr. Christiansen also practiced primary care and addiction medicine, with a focus on treatment of dependence throughout a person's lifespan, at Marshall Health and at PROACT (Provider Response Organization for Addiction Care & Treatment), a collaborative effort of Marshall Health, Cabell Huntington Hospital, St. Mary's Medical Center, and Thomas Health System.

Dr. Christiansen earned his Bachelor of Science at Denison University in Granville, Ohio, and his medical degree and a Master of Public Health from Marshall University. Dr. Christiansen also serves as the Medical Director and Board President of Ebenezer Medical Outreach, a free clinic in Huntington.

Open Project Opportunities

Dental project on Medicaid changes

An interdisciplinary team of WVU investigators was awarded funding from the CareQuest Foundation for Year 1 of a proposed 5-year research study to conduct a comprehensive review of the Adult Dental Medicaid program's implementation and impact in West Virginia. This multi-year project will assess the true need and unmet demand for services. It will characterize individuals and providers utilizing the benefit and evaluate the program's impact on emergency room visits by Medicaid recipients. Services for Kids in Primary-care (SKIP) project

This project is in partnership with a team from UPMC in Pittsburgh, on the Services for Kids in Primary-care (SKIP) Project. The study was funded to support a practice's capacity to implement an evidence-based collaborative care intervention for childhood behavior problems and comorbid ADHD in children 5 to 12 years of age. 
Network Highlights


